

# 630,000 ISRAELIS LIVE OUTSIDE ISRAEL\*









### 'ISRAEL-CONNECTED' people living outside of israel:




English-speaking countries and European countries hold the largest Israel-born Jewish communities

The impact of Israelis living abroad on different Jewish Diaspora communities can be substantial. In several countries, Israel-born Jews make up large proportions of the local Jewish population:

A large proportion of Israelis has the potential to be particularly transformative in small and medium-sized Jewish Diaspora communities. Immigration from Israel can impact everyday Jewish life, such as demand for school places, synagogues and other communal services, help change the trajectory of a declining Jewish population, and potentially change the cultural DNA of local Jewish communities.

Data in this report come from the JPR report *Israelis abroad:* Changing the Jewish Diaspora? published in March 2025. The research was conducted by the JPR European Jewish Demography Unit, which is dedicated to generating data about the fundamentals of European Jewish life. The unit provides key statistics that allow community leaders and policymakers to understand the structure of Jewish populations, to determine whether they are growing, declining or remain stable, to understand the factors underpinning any changes foreseen and to ensure community services meet the demands of the community.
